Gioachino Rossini's final opera, *Guillaume (William) Tell*

Speaker: David J. Collins, M.Ed.

Mr. Collins was Opera Boston's lecturer for 8 years and has given numerous opera courses at MIT, Regis College, Boston Center for Adult Education, Northeastern University, and the Cambridge Center for Adult Education. He graduated from Lesley University with a Master of Education degree, and *cum laude* from Boston University with a Bachelor of Music Education. His last offering for NEOC was a fabulous lecture on Richard Wagner's hero "Siegfried," part of the *Ring des Nibelungen* cycle.



William Tell is best known for its famous overture. However, there are many gorgeous arias, ensembles and choruses to be found in it.

It tells the story of the legendary hero, William Tell, who led the Swiss rebellion against Austrian rule. In order to convey this struggle and its success, Rossini enlarged the scope of opera writing. In so doing, he established the form of Grand Opera, which influenced many other composers including Donizetti, Bellini, Verdi and Wagner

Directions and parking:

Public Transportation: The library is accessible via MBTA Bus routes Express 502, Express 504, 52, 57, 59, 70, 70A and 71. It is less than a five-minute walk to the library from the buses that arrive at Watertown Yard.

From the West: Take Route 20 East (Main Street) to Watertown Square.

From the East: Take Route 16 West (Mt. Auburn Street). Turn right on Main Street.

Parking: There are plenty of metered (free on Sunday) parking spaces at the rear of the library, from which you can access the library through the back door. Drive in on the passage just before the Fire House.

The Library is fully handicap-accessible.

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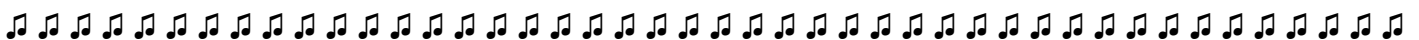

On This Day: Rolando Villazón, Renaissance Man

Rolando Villazón turns 45 on Wednesday, Feb. 22, 2017.

The Mexican tenor has managed a strong career over the past decade, conquering numerous struggles and paving new ways that have allowed him to remain at the forefront of opera's diversification and development. He has reshaped his repertoire to suit his vocal and dramatic abilities, but today we recognize him for the things he has done outside of singing and acting that have made him such a unique figure in the opera world.

The Director

Villazón's acting abilities have been one of his major assets in his career and it is no surprise that at some point the intellectual thinker would set his sights on directing. He kicked that career off in 2011 when he created a new production of *Werther* for the Opera de Lyon. From there he has moved into a vaster repertoire, taking on Puccini's *La Rondine*, Donizetti's *Viva la Mamma* and Verdi's *La Traviata*. His next assignment is *Don Pasquale* in Dusseldorf.

The Author

The Mexican wrote the 2013 novel *Malabares*, which narrates the story of a clown who suffers an injury and rediscovers a story he had been writing about an alter-ego clown, who is adored by the public but is also going through his own rough patch in his career.

The Artist

Villazón is also a terrific cartoonist who draws and animates his own work. Many of his illustrations are subversions of opera's famous works. You can check some of them out on his website:

The TV Host

Villazón stunned the world when he announced that he would be a judge and mentor on the TV show "Pop Star to Opera Star" in 2010 and 2011. He followed that up with his own TV series "Stars von morgen."
